



#### Ms. Lula Mae Friar

(1951-2020)



Lula Mae Friar was born on December 31, 1951, in the Busy Bee Community of Lexington, Mississippi, in Holmes County. As the fourth of 10 children to her Christian parents, Odessa and Abbie Wright Friar, both now deceased, she treasured her family deeply. Two of her siblings, Dessa Ree Friar Gibson and Marion Henry "Melvin" Friar, preceded her in death.

A woman of profound faith, "Ms. Lula" (as she was affectionately known) lived by the motto of "sending up timber every day," embracing praise, worship, daily Bible study, and a dedication to her family and community, especially the youth. A gifted gospel singer, she often sang through life's challenges, proclaiming, "God is keeping me."

Ms. Lula succumbed on July 12, 2020, after battling COVID-19, at the University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson, Mississippi.

A lifelong member of Lebanon Missionary Baptist Church in Lexington, she held numerous roles, including choir president, youth coordinator, and trustee.

Educationally, she graduated from Lexington Attendance Center (LAC) in 1969, where she was a majorette. She earned a choir scholarship to Rust College in Holly Springs, Mississippi, graduating from Rust, summa cum laude, in 1974 with a degree in elementary education.

Her teaching career began in 1975 at Sharkey County Elementary School and continued at Goodman-Pickens Elementary (GPE), where she dedicated 34 years to education. Ms. Lula was instrumental in student achievement efforts and held various leadership positions, including chair of the Teacher Support Team, and she assisted with the 504 programs. She was also honored as the Holmes County School District's 2004 Teacher of the Year.

Beyond the classroom, Ms. Lula mentored twirlers for JJ McClain High School Band and later for HCCHS "Prancing Jags," earning the title of "Band Mother." A passionate band booster, she traveled extensively with the award-winning band, even after her retirement as an educator. After retiring, she also continued her educational service at the Community Students Learning Center (CSLC), a 501 c 3 non-profit, where she served as its Education Director for various programs and services.

She is widely recognized for spearheading the establishment of Mississippi's only HIPPY program site at CSLC in Holmes County, Mississippi. HIPPY stands for Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters. She also diligently served as the Housing Advocate/Coordinator for the CSLC Federal Home Loan Bank of Dallas/Bank Plus Affordable Housing Program which helped low-income families in various communities with needed housing rehab. Ms. Lula faithfully served as the CSLC HIPPY Coordinator and Housing Coordinator until she was impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.

Known for her passion for family, education, care and dedication, she cherished her children and grandchildren, leaving behind one daughter, LaTannica Friar (Denham Springs, La.); one son, Fredrick Friar (Lexington, Denham Springs, La.); five granddaughters, one goddaughter, and a loving community of mentees. Her favorite scriptures were John 3:16 and Proverbs 3:5-6.

You were the true definition of a woman—mother, sister, aunt, cousin, teacher, co-worker, and friend. You lit up every room you walked into and never met a stranger. You were the most supportive person I have ever known, and I'm grateful you instilled that same trait in me.

No matter the miles or distance, you never missed a moment. Oh, how I miss my biggest cheerleader. Whenever I visited and had to leave, we would talk the entire ride back, or you'd call just to make sure I made it home safely. And every morning on my way to work, we talked. If we didn't, which was rare, you'd call right in the middle of my class and say, "Tan, now why you ain't call me? I almost overslept!" I miss that too. There's truly nothing like a mother's love.

Fred may have been older, but when it came to him, or any responsibility, you stepped in without hesitation. You were the real MVP.

And those grandkids? There was nothing you wouldn't do for them. You fussed, spoiled, and loved all at once. Your sisters and brothers meant everything to you. Y'all's bond was so strong, so admirable. You could always depend on each other.

And anybody who knew you knew you didn't play about that band! Wherever they went, you were right there. I remember when I first became a twirler, there were only two of us back then, you supported us at every single competition. You were so dedicated they made you the official twirler sponsor. That was over 20 years ago, and your love never wavered. Year after year, the team grew and so did your passion. Every girl who came through that team loved you and still does.

Let's not forget your 30 years as a dedicated teacher. Your passion for education was unmatched. The world needs more teachers like you. I try to be one but I'm not quite as good. However, they tell me I am. I became Teacher of the Year, just like you did. I believe it was in that moment I really realized I'm like you in more ways than I realized, and really stepped in your footsteps. Your dedication lives on.

You were so proud of your HIPPY babies. Oh, how you loved those kids! We'd be out and about, and you'd spot a child, stop what we were doing, and sign them up if they were eligible. You believed education was everything, and you were right. HIPPY helped students reach higher grades, better test scores, and even college success. You made a real difference.

You didn't just buy toys for my kids at Christmas, you brought books too. You knew the value of reading. You'd always say, "Education is the key." And now, we see exactly what you meant.

Ma, you truly left an impact on so many lives. You are deeply loved and missed. May you continue to rest in peace and love.

#### History of Bikers with CSLC-HIPPY Program





#### HISTORY

The Community Students Learning Center (CSLC) held its first HIPPY Fund Fest and Motorcycle Show on November 2, 2019, in Lexington, Mississippi. The event was the idea of longtime biker and CSLC/HIPPY volunteer Ida Walls and was co-coordinated with CSLC Education Coordinator Lula Friar to raise funds for the center's vital HIPPY program—an international, research-based early childhood literacy initiative. Since helping establish HIPPY in Holmes County in 2009, Ms. Friar had worked tirelessly to support early learning for rural children. Bikers from across Mississippi rallied behind the cause, and the event quickly expanded to include Corvette and Truck Clubs. Except for 2020—the year Ms. Friar passed away from COVID-19—the fundraiser has been held annually. Now in its sixth year, the event has helped support over 100 CSLC HIPPY children, thanks to the ongoing generosity of motorcycle, car, and truck clubs, as well as corporate and community donors.




